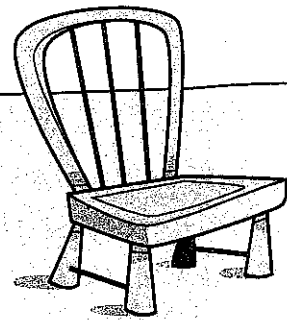

Nouns

A **noun** is a word that names a person, place, or thing.
Use exact nouns to make clear pictures.

Examples:

person = woman place = library thing = chair

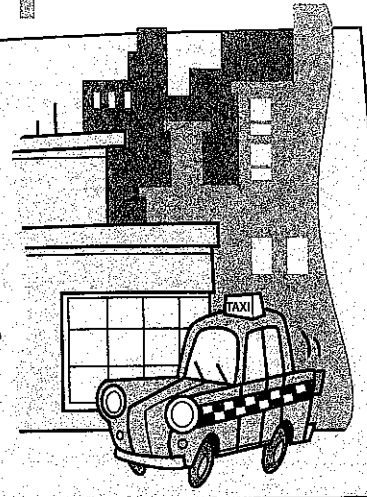
Common Nouns and Proper Nouns

A **common noun** names any person, place, or thing. It begins with a lowercase letter.

Examples:
inventor city month

A **proper noun** names a particular person, place, or thing. Each important word of a proper noun begins with a capital letter.

Examples:
Thomas Alva Edison Cleveland August

Proper Nouns





What is...



a noun?

Nouns tell which person, place thing, or idea.

Answering the question "Who or what jumped?" will help you locate most nouns.

✓Grandpa jumped, my cousin jumped, the dog jumped, the pumpkin jumped, etc.

a common noun?

Common Nouns are non-specific people, places, things, and ideas. Common nouns are not capitalized unless they begin a sentence.

Answering the question "Who or what jumped?" will help you locate most common nouns.

✓Grandpa jumped, my cousin jumped, the dog jumped, the pumpkin jumped, etc.

a proper noun?

Proper Nouns are the specific names of people, places, and things.

Answering the question "Who or what sat?" using a specific name will help you locate most proper nouns.

✓Grandpa Joe sat, my cousin Maria sat, that dog Fido sat, the pumpkin sat on the Golden Gate Bridge, etc.

an adjective?

Adjectives describe a noun or pronoun.

Answering the question "What does the cat look like?" will help you locate most adjectives.

✓The cat is small, chubby, happy, sassy, brownish, grumpy, etc. The suffix -ous means "full of", and adjectives often end in -ous.

a verb?

Verbs show action or state of being.

Answering the question "What did the cat do?" will help you locate most verbs.

✓The cat ate, meowed, slept, stretched, jumped, etc.

an adverb?

Adverbs describe how something was done.

Answering the question "How did the cat run?" will help you locate most adverbs.

✓The cat ran quickly, slowly, clumsily, frantically, excitedly, etc.

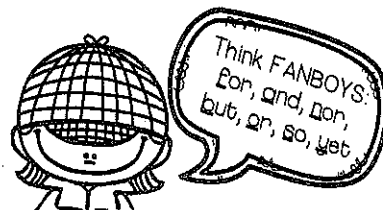
a conjunction?

Conjunctions connect words, phrases, and clauses together.

Answering the questions "What else?, Why?, Why not?, So what?" will help you locate most conjunctions.

✓We ran to the train, but we didn't make it in time.

✓We ran to the train, and we made it just in time.





What is...



a pronoun?

Pronouns take the place of naming the noun.

Answering the question "Who or what jumped?" will help you locate most pronouns.

✓Grandpa jumped, my cousin jumped, the dog jumped, the pumpkin jumped, etc.

a personal pronoun?

Personal pronouns are pronouns used instead of a noun that names a definite person or thing.

Answering the question "Who or what is sitting?" will help you locate most personal pronouns.

✓She is sitting on the couch, they are sitting on the couch, we are sitting on the couch, it is sitting on the couch, etc.

a possessive pronoun?

Possessive pronouns are words that take the place of naming the noun and also demonstrate ownership

Answering the question "Whose pencils are on the desk?" will help you locate most possessive pronouns.

✓My pencils are on the desk, his pencils are on the desk, your pencils are on the desk, their pencils are on the desk, the pencils on the desk are mine, the pencils on the desk are yours, hers, theirs, etc.

✓Note that the possessive pronoun "its" also shows ownership.

For example, "I like its color." shows that the color belongs to whatever "its" is referring to

a reflexive pronoun?

Reflexive pronouns are pronouns ending in -self or -selves and are used when the object of the sentence is the same as the subject of the sentence.

Asking someone what you or someone else did and referring back to the subject will help you locate most reflexive pronouns. If you took out the reflexive pronoun, the recipient of the sandwich is unclear.

✓I made myself a sandwich, she made herself a sandwich, he made himself a sandwich, they made themselves sandwiches, etc.

✓Reflexive pronouns include myself, yourself, himself, herself, oneself, itself, ourselves, yourselves, themselves

an interjection?

Interjections exclaim excitement or emotion.

Answering the question "What word or phrase was yelled or exclaimed when it happened?" will help you locate most interjections.

✓When she fell, the girl yelled, "Ouch!" or "Damn!" or "Oops!" or "Yay!"

a preposition?

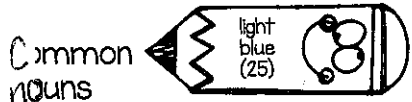
Prepositions show position or location.

Answering the question "Where can a cat go?" will help you locate most prepositions.

✓A cat can go under, atop, between, around, through, etc.
