Superintendent Rick Weber, Business Manager Stacey VanBeek, and Principals Nichole Herzog, Brian Relf, and Jay Swatek were also present.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

“Power Up” – Summer School Program:

The Boys & Girls Club of Flandreau plans to serve 30 youth in K-3th grade in a five-week intensive reading and math summer learning loss prevention program. This program works in close relation and collaborates with both the Flandreau School District administrative offices and classroom teachers to take a pro-active approach to address challenges and maintain learning levels for youth prior to getting significantly behind their peers throughout the summer months.

Flandreau School District:

The Flandreau School District will work with the Boys & Girls Club of Flandreau to create success for kids in Flandreau during the summer months and to create an opportunity for all youth to start the school year not regressing in the areas of reading and math. The Flandreau School District will:

- Assist in the funding of the Summer School program with a \$5,000 annual contribution to the program. This will approximately cover the cost of 20 of the 30 summer school students.
- School will identify students in K-3th grade that would benefit from the Power Up program and reach out to those families
- Hand out and collect applications from families to enroll in the program
- Fill out individual information sheets on each child, where their strengths, challenges and areas of need exist
- Communicate regularly with the Club teachers when necessary
- Follow up discussions on the impact and progress made in the upcoming fall with the administrative team, principals and others involved in the program
- Test scores and evaluation scores shared with the Club that would help in the youth learning and evaluation of the program

Boys & Girls Club of Flandreau:

The Boys & Girls Club of Flandreau will work with the Flandreau School District to create success for kids in out of school time and support the Flandreau School District in getting all youth at reading levels and maintaining their school progress throughout the summer. The Boys & Girls Club will:

- Prepare applications, educate and communicate with teachers on enrollment in the program and work closely with each school to enroll every youth that is in need
- Create the summer school curriculum based off of and incorporating best practices for proven success in addressing summer learning loss
- Hire, pay and manage lead teacher, classroom teachers and support staff
- Manage communication with parents, registration and follow up upon receiving applications from the school district
- Do internal pre and post assessments during the program, as well as, incorporating existing school testing to analyze the retention of information and success
- Provide results to the school district on individual and overall progress, successes and challenges in the program
- Location and site management of the program
- The management of the expenses, funding and sustainability of the program
- Manage parent communication
- Manage and develop the continued relationship with SDSU and the Harmony program
- The Flandreau School District logo will be included on applications and information on the program

SOUTH DAKOTA HIGH SCHOOL ACTIVITIES ASSOCIATION PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

Proposed Constitutional Change—Submitted by SDHSAA Staff:

Amend the SDHSAA Constitution and Bylaws as follows (new language in **BOLD AND UNDERLINED**): Chapter II – Bylaws for Athletics; Part I – Further Eligibility Requirements for Athletic Contests; Section 9.

Student/Coach Ejection from a Contest.

SECTION 9. STUDENT/COACH EJECTION FROM A CONTEST. Any student or coach ejected from an interscholastic contest by game officials will be ineligible for the next regularly scheduled contest at that level of competition and all other contests in the interim at any level of competition.

In the sport of football only, any player ejected/disqualified for specifically violating the provisions of "Illegal Personal Contact" as outlined in Rule 9-4-3 of the NFHS Football Rules:

(a) Shall be disqualified only for the remainder of the current game if the foul occurs in the first half of a game, or,

(b) Shall be disqualified from the remainder of the current game, as well as the first half of the next varsity contest, if the foul occurs in the second half of a game.

A second ejection that occurs during the same sport season shall cause that coach or athlete to be ineligible for the next four regularly scheduled contests at that level of competition and all other contests in the interim at any level of competition.

A third ejection...

Rationale: The intent of this rule is to provide a lesser penalty for in-game contact fouls that may or may not be adjudicated properly by contest officials. NFHS Rule 9-4-3 allows for the ejection of a player when flagrant personal contact acts occur, such as targeting or a blindside block. The intention is to reduce what can be an ejection that requires a sit-out of nearly 25% of an athlete's season for plays that, while should be taken out of the game, remain difficult to officiate. Of note, acts such as fighting, contacting a game official, and other heinous acts are not given leeway by this rule, and would still require the two-game sit-out. NFHS Rule 9-4-3 more generally references acts that are more germane to actual football plays; this rule change would allow our officials, coaches and administrators a bit of a reprieve when dealing with an ejection for what may or may not have been a "football play." The penalty structure mirrors what is currently in place in the NCAA, but remains more strict on unsportsmanlike or other conduct issues.

Career in teaching and coaching: Hurley, SD (76-78); Miller, SD (78-80); Aberdeen Central (80-81); Aberdeen Roncalli (81-85); and Aberdeen Central (85-2006). Assistant High School Principal at Aberdeen Central High School (2006-2015). 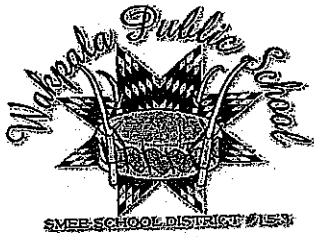
Randy Hartmann
